Narrative Summary:

At approximately 10:45 AM on September 14, 2024, Lisle Police Dispatch received a 911 call reporting an armed robbery in progress at First National Bank, located at 3200 Ogden Avenue. The call was placed by the bank's assistant manager, [redacted], who indicated two armed individuals had entered the bank, demanded money, and were threatening employees and customers.

Upon arrival at the scene at 10:52 AM, Officers Brian Jacobs (#785) and Amanda Lee (#813) secured the perimeter. Bank employees and customers were evacuated, and witnesses were interviewed. No injuries were reported on-site, although multiple individuals were treated for emotional distress by paramedics from Lisle Fire Department. Lisle Police have alerted neighboring jurisdictions and coordinated with the Illinois State Police and the FBI.

Suspect Information:

- Suspect #1 (Male)
 - Height: Approx. 6'0"
 - Clothing: Black hoodie, dark pants, black mask
 - Weapon: Black semi-automatic handgun
 - Additional details: Witnesses reported he was the more vocal of the two suspects and demanded the bank teller to fill a bag with cash.

- Suspect #2 (Female)
 - Height: Approx. 5'5"
 - Clothing: Gray jacket, blue jeans, red scarf covering face
 - Weapon: Silver revolver
 - Additional details: Witnesses reported she appeared calmer but stood guard near the entrance during the robbery.

- Incident Details:

According to witness statements, Suspect #1 entered the bank and loudly ordered everyone to get on the ground, while Suspect #2 directed customers to remain by the front door. Suspect #1 approached the teller's counter and handed over a black duffel bag, instructing the tellers to place all available cash inside. The suspects made off with approximately \$32,000 in cash.

The suspects exited through the rear entrance of the bank and fled the scene in what appeared to be a dark-colored sedan, possibly a Toyota Camry or Honda Accord. Surveillance cameras captured footage of the vehicle's make and model, though the license plate was not visible.

Fake Interview with Lisle Police Chief Samantha Rhodes

Reporter: Chief Rhodes, can you tell us about the status of the investigation into this morning's bank robbery at First National Bank?

Chief Rhodes: Yes, the investigation is ongoing, and we're pursuing several leads. Our officers arrived at the scene within minutes of the 911 call, but the suspects had already fled. We are currently reviewing surveillance footage from both inside the bank and nearby businesses to track their movements. We're also working closely with the FBI since this incident involved a financial institution.

Reporter: Are there any updates on the suspects?

Chief Rhodes: At this point, we have a general description of the suspects based on eyewitness accounts. One is a male, approximately 6 feet tall, wearing dark clothing, and the other is a female, about 5'5", dressed in casual attire. Both were armed and made verbal threats during the robbery. We're hopeful that the footage we've collected will provide more detailed information.

Reporter: Was anyone inside the bank harmed?

Chief Rhodes: Thankfully, no one was physically harmed, though several people were understandably shaken by the incident. Bank staff and customers were forced to comply with the robbers' demands, and while the suspects were aggressive, they left the premises without causing physical injury.

Reporter: Can you share any details about how the suspects fled the scene?

Chief Rhodes: The suspects fled in a dark-colored sedan, and we believe they may have used a side street to avoid main roads. We've alerted neighboring jurisdictions and have officers monitoring highways and key traffic points. We're asking anyone who might have seen a vehicle matching that description to come forward with information.

Reporter: How is the community responding to this incident?

Chief Rhodes: I think the community is understandably concerned. Bank robberies are not common in Lisle, and incidents like this can be unsettling. However, we've increased our patrols and are working to assure residents that their safety remains our top priority. We're confident that with the public's help, we can bring these individuals to justice.

Reporter: One last question, Chief. Is there any advice you would give to residents during this investigation?

Chief Rhodes: Absolutely. First, we encourage everyone to remain vigilant. If you see something suspicious or out of place, please report it to the police. Secondly, we're asking anyone who may have been in the area at the time of the robbery to review any dashcam or security camera footage they might have. Even the smallest detail could be a breakthrough in this case.

Reporter: Thank you for your time, Chief.

Chief Rhodes: You're welcome. We're committed to resolving this and keeping Lisle a safe place to live and work.

Fake Interview with Bank Witness - Emily Carlson (Customer)

Reporter: Thank you for speaking with me, Emily. I understand you were inside the bank when the robbery took place. Can you walk us through what happened from your perspective?

Emily Carlson: It all happened so fast. I had just finished filling out a deposit slip and was waiting in line when these two people came storming in. The guy started yelling right away, telling everyone to get down. It was terrifying. I didn't even have time to think—I just hit the floor like everyone else.

Reporter: How long did the whole situation last?

Emily Carlson: It felt like forever, but in reality, it couldn't have been more than five minutes. They knew exactly what they were doing. The guy went straight to the teller and threw a bag over the counter, demanding cash. The woman stayed by the door, watching us. She didn't say much, just kept waving her gun around, making sure we didn't move.

Reporter: Were you able to get a good look at the robbers?

Emily Carlson: Not really, no. They both had masks on—he was wearing a black hoodie, and she had a scarf over her face. He was taller, and she was shorter, but that's about all I could make out. They were very focused on getting the money and leaving. They didn't really interact with us other than shouting instructions.

Reporter: Did you notice anything unusual about their behavior?

Emily Carlson: What stood out to me was how calm the woman was. It's like she'd done this before or something—she wasn't panicking at all. The man was more aggressive, yelling and waving his gun around, but she seemed almost bored, like it was routine. It was so strange.

Reporter: How did the other customers and employees react during the robbery?

Emily Carlson: Everyone was scared, of course. There were a few people crying quietly, and one of the tellers looked like she was in shock, but we all stayed still. No one tried to be a hero or anything like that. We just wanted to get out of there alive. The robbers weren't interested in hurting anyone—they just wanted the money and to leave.

Reporter: Did you see what happened when they left?

Emily Carlson: Yeah, I was still on the floor, but I could hear them running out the back door. After that, it was like a wave of relief hit the room, but we were all still scared to move. Someone finally called the police after they were gone, but it took a few moments for anyone to process what had just happened.

Reporter: How are you feeling now, after everything that happened?

Emily Carlson: Honestly, I'm still shaken up. I've never been in a situation like that before, and it's going to take me a while to get over it. But I'm just thankful no one was hurt. It could've been so much worse.

Reporter: Thank you for sharing your experience, Emily. I hope you're able to find some peace after this.

Emily Carlson: Thank you. I'm just glad it's over.
